A Snapshot: Massachusetts MRC Unit Activities

Massachusetts MRC units responded to the COVID-19 pandemic, dedicating approximately 57,420 volunteer hours to supporting their communities in a wide array of response roles. Common **Massachusetts MRC** missions included:

- Testing support
- Medical surge, including care at alternate care sites, hospitals, and long-term care facilities
- Case investigations and contact tracing support
- Call center operations
- · Patient surveillance and follow-up
- Community screening, including wellness/temperature screenings for visitors at various community buildings and events
- Personal protective equipment coordination and distribution
- Community outreach, including food distribution to those impacted by the pandemic and phone calls/check-ins to homebound seniors
- Infection prevention support during elections, ensuring the safety of voters and poll workers
- · Behavioral health support

In response to two pediatric meningococcal disease cases, **Boston MRC (Boston, MA)** volunteers assisted at a clinic to provide children, staff, and families with meningococcal disease vaccinations at a local daycare center co-located with a shelter for families experiencing homelessness.

Brookline MRC (Brookline, MA) volunteers staffed outdoor cooling centers during periods of extreme heat over the summer.
