A Snapshot: Nebraska MRC Unit Activities

Nebraska MRC units responded to the COVID-19 pandemic, dedicating approximately 1,225 volunteer hours to supporting their communities in a wide array of response roles. Common **Nebraska MRC** missions included:

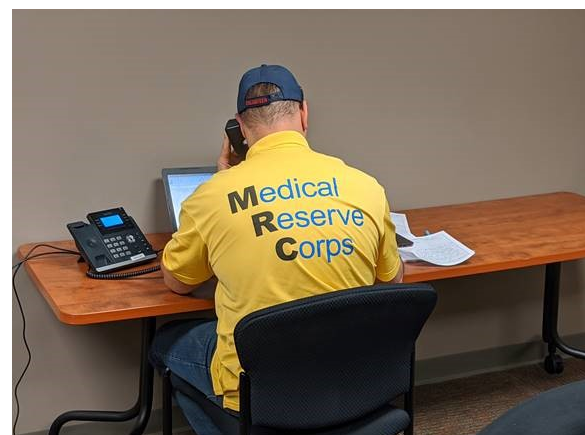
- Contact tracing support
- Public health command center support
- Community screening (e.g., wellness and temperature checks at public events)
- Test result follow-up (e.g., providing patients with individual results from mass testing events)
- Logistics support, including distributing personal protective equipment
- Data entry support

As firefighters tended to a large, residential structure fire in the community, **Central Nebraska MRC (Hastings, NE)** volunteers provided firefighter rehabilitation support on scene for over six hours, evaluating and checking vitals of responders.

Eastern Nebraska/Western Iowa MRC (Omaha, NE) participated in a sheltering exercise with the American Red Cross. During the exercise, volunteers were responsible for providing medical services.

Southeast Nebraska MRC (Crete, NE) volunteers provided medical stand-by support during a number of community events, including the 2020 Cornhusker State Games. **Central Nebraska MRC (Hastings, NE)** provided first aid coverage for the state fair in August and September 2020.
